The Outbreak of Persecution

From peace to persecution

- Chapters 1-2 the chief actor is the Holy Spirit
- Chapters 3-6 the chief actor is Satan

Identical flow in chs. 3-4 as in ch. 2

• Miraculous event (2:1-13; 3:1-10) + Sermon from Peter (2:14-36; 3:11-26) + The consequences

Section outline:

- 3:1-10 A cripple is healed
- 3:11-26 Peter's second sermon
- 4:1-22 The council arrests the apostles
- 4:23-31 The church turns to God in prayer

3:1-10 - A Cripple is Healed

- V. 1 "at the ninth hour" 3pm, following the evening sacrifice
- V. 2 "Beautiful Gate" wain eastern entrance into the temple from the Court of the Gentiles. 75 feet high, huge double doors, covered in brass

Details - Luke the doctor

- V. 2 "lame from his mother's womb" a ______ disease
- 3:42 over 40 years old
- V. 2 so severely handicapped he could not walk
- Vv. 3-4 asking for alms, but not looking at the apostles
- V. 6 "I do not possess silver and gold, but what I do have I give to you: In the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene—walk!"
- V. 7a "And seizing him by the right hand, he raised him up"
 - o A gesture of ______ (cf. Luke 8:54)
- V. 7b "immediately his feet and his ankles were strengthened"
 - Not just a healing of a congenital problem, but of 40+ years of inactivity and atrophy
- V. 8 "With a leap...he entered the temple...leaping" cf. Isa. 35:6
- V. 9 crowd witnessed him "walking" (3x mentioned)

3:11-26 - Peter's Second Sermon

V.	12 - begin	s by	ascribing	the event	to _		 	_	
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V. 13 - _____ with the Old Testament - Jesus as fulfillment

Vv. 13-15 - The Jew's fourfold rejection of Christ:

- V. 13 you "delivered" him over to be killed
- V. 13 you "disowned" him
- V. 14 you "disowned the Holy and Righteous One"
- V. 15 you "put to death the Prince of life"
 - Άρχηγὸν (archegon) "prince" (NASB), originator, author, leader

Significant titles:

- V. 6 Jesus Christ of Nazareth (Cf. Luke 22:59 denied him as a "Galilean")
- V. 13 God's "servant" who suffered (v. 18) and was then glorified (v. 26; cf. 4:27) Isa. 52:13ff.
- V. 14 "the Holy and Righteous One" In contrast to Barabbas and Pilate
- V. 22 "prophet" foretold by Moses
- 4:11 rejected stone who became the cornerstone

Challenge of repentance

- The requirement of repentance:
 - V. 17 "you acted in ignorance, just as your rulers did also" (cf. Luke 23:34)
 - V. 18 fulfillment of prophecy.
 - Neither their ignorance nor God's predictions ______ them. They must "repent and turn to God" (v. 19)
- Three blessings that follow repentance:
 - V. 19b "that your sins may be wiped away" Ἐξαλειφω (exaleipho) "wash off, erase, obliterate"
 - V. 19c "that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord"
 - The positive counterpart to wiping away
 - He replaces our sins with a refreshment of our spirits
 - o V. 20 "that He may send Jesus, the Christ appointed for you" fullness at his return

Vv. 22-25 - 3 Prophetic strands come together (Moses, Samuel and his successors, and Abraham)

Suffered and died as God's servant	Isa. 53	Acts 2:23; 3:18
Stone the builders rejected becomes the cornerstone	Ps. 118:22	Acts 4:11
God raised him from the dead	Isa. 52:13	Acts 2:25ff.
Death could not hold him, God would not abandon to decay	Ps. 16:8ff.	Acts 2:24, 27, 31
God exalted him to his right hand to wait for final triumph	Ps. 110:1	Acts 2:34-35
His Spirit would be poured out	Joel 2:28ff.	Acts 2:16ff.
The gospel would be preached worldwide	Isa. 57:19	Acts 2:39
He would be opposed	Ps. 2:1ff.	Acts 4:25-26
