

- "fervently" = ektenos, same word used of Jesus in Gethsemane (Luke 22:44) -
 - Perseverance (without letting up) + intensity (fervor, urgency) = a fervent, incessant, agonizing prayer
 - Cf. Phil. 1:19 & Philemon 22 Paul's belief that through the prayers of the church he would be delivered.
- 2 powers arrayed against the other:
 - The world with swords, guards, chains, and prison walls
 - o The church with prayer

Herod's Death - vv. 19b-24

Vv. 20-23 - historical details surrounding the death of Herod

- Quarrel with the people of Tyre and Sidon, cities on the Phoenician coast
- Seeking resolution via Blastus
- Herod in regal attire
 - Josephus: "made wholly of silver and of a contexture truly wonderful" which shone so brightly in the morning sun that the people hailed him as a god, saying "We have feared you as a man, yet henceforth we agree that you are more than mortal in your being."
 - o Luke in v. 22 "The people kept crying out, 'The voice of a god and not of a man!"
 - Josephus: "Upon this the king did neither rebuke them nor reject their impious flattery."
- God's judgment fell on Herod because he glorified himself rather than God.
 - Luke: "eaten by worms and died"
 - o Josephus: "a severe pain arose in his belly" and died 5 days later

Juxtaposition of the death of a tyrant to v. 24
