Final Greetings (v. 12)
V. 12a - "through Silvanus (Silas) I have written to you"
"With the help of" (NIV, NLT), "by" (ESV, KJV)
Used to describe the of a letter
 Acts 15:23 - γραψαντες δια χειρος αυτων - lit. "having written through the hands of them"
V. 22 - because they were faithful "leaders among the brothers"
 "our faithful brother (for so I regard him)" - Silas is worthy to be
 Closely associated with (greetings of I and II Thess; II Cor. 1:19)
o A (Acts 15:32)
V. 12b = Beautiful of the whole of the letter and its theology
Writing to exhort and encourage the scattered people of God
Week 1: Instructive, applicational,

Because Peter's witness is true, his encouragement is
 Not "cling to impersonal moral code or philosophical abstractions"
 Cing to the grace of the Triune God!
Onlytation and Danadiation (vs. 42.44)
Salutation and Benediction (vv. 13-14)
V. 13 - "Babylon"
Symbolically referring to
Babylon = city of captivity (587 BC)
 1:1 - writing to the new "diaspora" - the people of God scattered throughout the world
Broader use: symbol of the arrogant pomp and power of the world
o Isaiah (ch. 47) - anticipating the eventual fall of the whole world system which stands in
opposition to God
 Revelation (Rev. 14:8; 16:19; 17:5; 18:2, 10) - embodiment of evil and opposition to God
A "" of worldly and idolatrous powers under Satanic control
■ An "" of the heavenly Jerusalem
 The object of God's judgement and wrath at the coming of Christ
V. 13 - "shechosen together with you, sends you greetings"
The those called by God, elect in Christ, sprinkled with his blood (1:1-2)

- V. 13 also "my son, Mark"
 - As Luke was the writer for Paul, so Mark was for Peter
 - As Timothy was a "son" to Paul, so Mark was to Peter
- V. 14a "Greet one another with a kiss of love"
 - The gathering of the church = the setting for this command
 - Not in contrast to Paul's "holy kiss" (I Thess. 5:26-27; Rom. 16:16; I Cor. 16:20; II Cor. 13:12)
 - Emphasizes the bond of _____ that unites brothers and sisters in Christ (1:22; 4:8)
 - o An outward expression of the tender affection that unites them as family.
- V. 14b "Peace be to you all who are in Christ."
 - Ends as he began (1:2)
 - Had received from Jesus who authorized him to pronounce it (John 20:19-23, 26)
 - Expands upon shalom (greeting, wholeness, things as they should be)
 - Not absence of conflict, suffering, or pain, but presence of God amidst it (Num. 6:26)
 - Pronounced by Jesus in the shadow of the cross (John 14:27), referring to the Spirit
 - Absence of conflict
 - 1:2 = summarizes the whole message of the letter
 - God's peace is available to them in abundance because of Christ
 - They can face whatever comes with him by their side and in their hearts.
 - Neither the roar of the lion nor the flames of persecution can overthrow the peace of Christ's salvation
 - Peter's apostolic blessing reaches across the centuries and around the globe to all who now share suffering in Christ, and will in a short time share in his heavenly glory.
