The Ground of the Social Test of Love

3x on test of love (2:7-11; 3:11-18)

"love one another" \rightarrow 3x in 6 vv. (v. 7, exhortation; v. 11, statement of duty; v. 12, hypothesis The ground of the imperative:

- God is love in himself (vv. 8, 16)
- God has loved us in Christ (vv. 10-11)
- God continues to love in and through us (vv. 12-13)

/. 7 - Greek assonance: 'Αγαπητο'	, ἀγαπῶμεν	("agapetoi agapomen")	- "Beloved, let us love"
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- Urge to love and assurance to love: John ______ what he preaches
- Both integrity and testimony

Vv. 7-8 - his argument: "love is from God" (v. 7) + "God is love" (v. 8) = "everyone who loves is born of God and knows God"

"God is love" (vv. 8, 16)

- Stott: "Love is the most comprehensive and sublime of all affirmations about God's being."
- Wesley, Notes: "This little sentence brought St. John more sweetness, even in the time he was
 writing it, than the whole world can bring. God is often styled holy, righteous, wise; but not
 holiness, righteousness, or wisdom in the abstract, as he is said to be love; intimating that this is
 his darling, his reigning attribute, the attribute that sheds an amiable glory on all his other
 perfections."

- E.L. Mascall, Whatever Happened to the Human Mind: "The Trinity is not a doctrine, any more than the incarnation is a doctrine. There is a doctrine about the Trinity, as there are doctrines about many other facts of existence, but, if Christianity is true, the Trinity is not a doctrine; the Trinity is God. It is the secret of God's most intimate life and being, into which, in his infinite love and generosity, he has admitted us; and it is therefore to be accepted with amazed and exultant gratitude."
