The Ten Commandments Deuteronomy 4.44-5.21

4.44-4.45 Introduction to the Covenant

- Torah: <u>instruction</u>, teaching is usually translated with the word "law."
- > Testimonies: witness and warning, admonition.
- > Statues: decrees, law, prescription, regulation.
- > Rules: judgments, just decrees.

All together these are the whole law that Moses set before the people of Israel (4.44).

5.1-5.5 Introduction to the Covenant

Moses commands the people to:

- ➤ Hear: Hearing includes responding, heeding and obeying.
- Learn: Learning includes more than memorizing, it is also learning to live
- ➤ Be careful to <u>do</u>: The law requires a lifestyle of obedience.

The Lord (5.2,3):

- Made a covenant.
- > Spoke face to face.
- > Through a mediator.

5.6–21 The Covenant

The Ten Words on Two Tablets.

Significance:

- Unique Revelation.
- > Unique Medium.
- > Unique Preservation.

Note: There is not universal agreement on how to number the commandments, just that there are ten.

Facets of the Moral Law

- > The Nature and Character of God
- > The Ideal Human Nature
- > Seed, root, branch, fruit
- > The Prohibitions
- > The Requirements
- ➤ How Jesus Transforms
- ➤ How Jesus Fulfills

- ➤ Society, Culture and Civil Governments

What the Law Cannot Do:

- ➤ Justify: Gal. 2.19–21, 3.10–14, 21–23 [Deut. 27.26].
- Restrain: Rom 7.5–14.
- Liberate: Gal. 3.23; Rom. 7.14–8.7; Rom 6.1–14.
- Sanctify: Rom. 7.21–8.7; Gal. 3.2–6; Rom 6.15–23.

What the Law Can Do:

- > Reveal the Perfection of God.
- > Reveal the Corruption of people.
- > Reveal our Hopeless Condition.
- > Reveal the Only Solution to our dilemma.
- Reveal the Standard of Holiness and practical righteousness.

Bottom Line:

We need the law written on our hearts.

In Christ by the Spirit we have the law written on our hearts.

In Christ God has made a <u>new covenant</u> where his laws are written on his people's hearts (Jer. 31.31–34; Hebrews 9.15–18).
